- a. Job Corps briefly paused in May due to federal court cases but is now fully operational.
- b. Santa Cruz County youth are active in Job Corps and residing on-site.

**Presenter: Mauricio Chavez**

- a. Total WIOA funds: **\$699,000; 56% spent.**
- b. Adult Program: **86% spent** (strong progress).
- c. Dislocated Worker: **50% spent** (historically the most difficult to utilize).
- d. Administration: **59% spent.**
- e. Rapid Response PY24: **85% spent**, remaining ~\$15k expected to be fully used.
- f. Overall spending trends **significantly improved** compared to prior years.

**Discussion Points**

- a. Board acknowledges strong improvement in fund utilization and reduced return of funds.
- b. Goal remains to expend all **eligible** funds by **June 30** fiscal year-end.
- c. Dislocated Worker category remains challenging but performing much better this year.
- d. Staff continues to ensure all expenditures meet WIOA eligibility requirements.

## Santa Cruz County Partner Reports

### Title I:

Title I Program Certifications continues to expand outreach, strengthen partnerships, and support the community through recruitment, training certifications, and employment services.

Title I continues to support 10 In-School Youth participants, including eight Nogales High School Automotive CTE students participating in work experience opportunities with Jim Click Automotive, one participant at PBS Autobody Shop, and one Pierson CTE Firefighter student participating in the Nogales Fire Department.

Several informative presentations were provided at the ARIZONA@WORK office during this reporting period. Julie Wan and Jessica Brooks, from Goodwill, presented on workforce development services available within the community. Goodwill continues to provide employment services at their office on the first and fourth Friday of each month.

The Migrant Seasonal Farm Worker Outreach Program also visited the office to provide information regarding services available to agricultural workers. Their outreach efforts focus on visiting agricultural work sites to educate H-2A workers on workforce rights and available resources.

Additionally, Andre Prince, Arizona Office of Apprenticeship, presented to staff regarding apprenticeship opportunities and program development.

Community outreach efforts continue through participation in local events to provide information regarding workforce services and recruitment, with a continued emphasis on serving Out of School Youth. Title I staff, alongside Title partner programs, participated in the following events:

Pima Community College Educational Fair 2026

Neuro Diversity Community Resource Fair

Pierson Educational Fair

Rio Rico Community Days Fair

OS3 Marathon Healthcare Fair

These events provided valuable opportunities to share programmatic information, strengthen community partnerships, and recruit potential participants into workforce and training services.

## **Title II:**

Over the past year, the Santa Cruz County Continuing Education Title II Adult Ed Program has demonstrated strong improvements in student outcomes, particularly in measurable skill gains. ABE maintained consistent performance, reflecting steady instructional quality. ESOL showed the greatest growth, with students making significant progress in their language development and achieving the highest gains across all program areas. The ESOL program met and surpassed the annual MSG target of 45%, increasing its measurable skill gains from 25.96% to 46.15%. The IET program was initiated during this period, marking an important step in expanding our instructional offerings, and work is underway to support student progress as the program continues to develop. We also submitted a revised Retail Industry Fundamentals IET program plan along with Pre-IET Course Workplace Safety Foundations, focusing on OSHA 10 regulations, both of which will result in enrolled ESOL students earning either an industry credential/badge and/or certificate. Overall, the SCCCE Title II program has made great strides with an overall 43.17% (2026) PoPs compared to 26.64% (2025)PoPs a total of 16.51% PoP increase. Finally, the program will be celebrating 18 graduates on May 28, 2026, with board invitations forthcoming.

Efforts are continuing to strengthen employer partnerships throughout Santa Cruz County to identify workforce needs and develop employment opportunities for program participants. Christine and Ana remain committed to expanding training placements that provide participants with valuable skills development and hands-on work experience aligned with local labor market demands. As the fiscal year comes to a close, outreach activities, employer engagement, and collaboration with community partners will increase significantly and continue at full force into the next fiscal year to boost enrollments and expand employment and training opportunities for eligible farmworkers and their dependents.

Business Services managers reported a lot of activity around the state. Employer participation is good, and there are lots of clients looking for work.

## Director Report

ARIZONA@WORK Santa Cruz County is currently working on the development of the Infrastructure Funding Agreement for July 1, 2027, through June 30, 2029. The Infrastructure Funding Agreement outlines how One Stop Partners will share infrastructure and operational costs associated with the ARIZONA@WORK Job Center to ensure continued workforce services throughout the Local Area.

Staff is also working on the Memorandum of Understanding between the Santa Cruz County Local Workforce Development Board and Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act One Stop Partners. The Memorandum of Understanding establishes the roles, responsibilities, and collaborative commitments of all required partners to support coordinated workforce, education, and support services for the community.

Work is also underway on the Local Plan Modifications due October 30, 2026, with final submission scheduled for January 29, 2027, following review and feedback from the Office of Economic Opportunity Council staff. It is important that all Board Members participate in discussions related to the Local Plan as workforce needs continue to evolve and industries continue to change throughout Santa Cruz County.

Santa Cruz County Provisional Community College, South32, and Santa Cruz County are currently working on a Workforce Strategic Plan involving all major industries within Santa Cruz County. We are also in discussions with WestEd regarding the possibility of assisting with the Local Plan Modifications process since they are already working on the Workforce Strategic Plan, allowing both efforts to align closely.

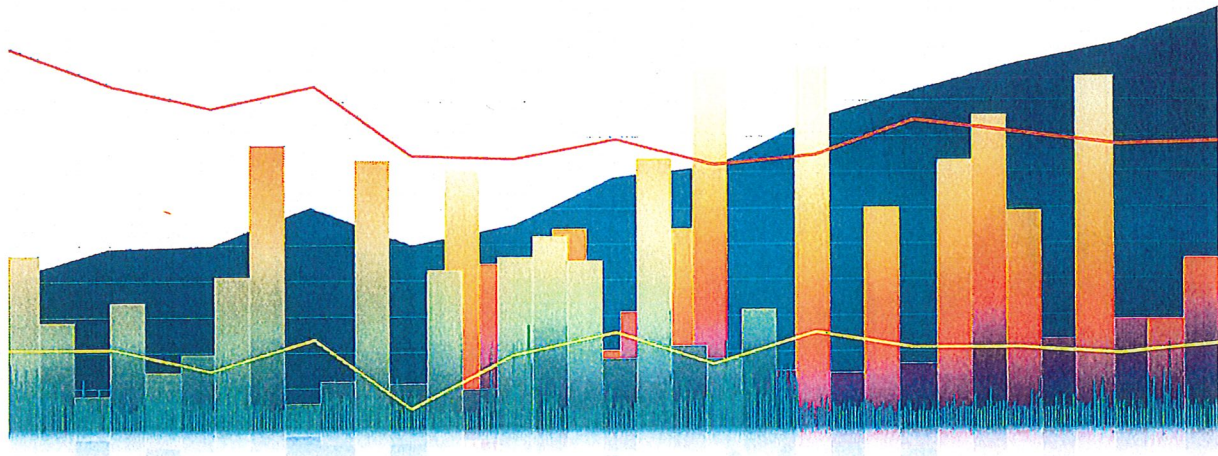
